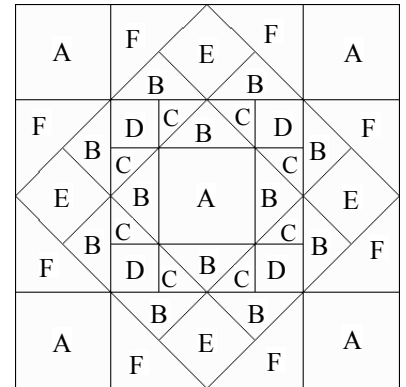
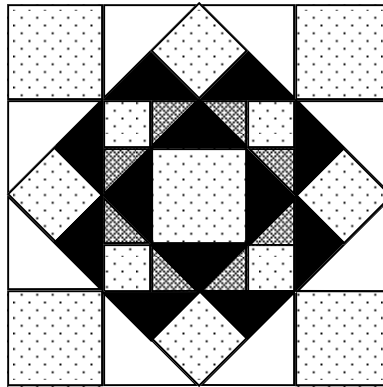


HULL'S VICTORY



All instructions include 1/4" seam allowances



Rotary Cut

Use this pattern in a *Block By Block* quilt or anywhere you need a 12" (12 1/2" x 12 1/2" with seam allowances) block.

From the fabric for A, cut 5 squares, 3 1/2" x 3 1/2".

From the fabric for B, cut 3 squares, 4 1/4" x 4 1/4".

Cut each square twice diagonally, to yield 12 triangles.

From the fabric for C, cut 4 squares, 2 3/8" x 2 3/8".

Cut each square once diagonally, to yield 8 triangles.

From the fabric for D, cut 4 squares, 2" x 2".

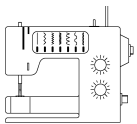
From the fabric for E, cut 4 squares, 2 5/8" x 2 5/8".

From the fabric for F, cut 4 squares, 3 7/8" x 3 7/8".

Cut each square once diagonally, to yield 8 triangles.

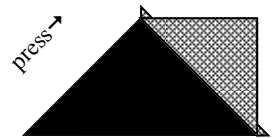
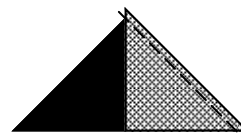

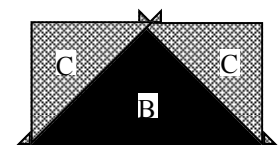
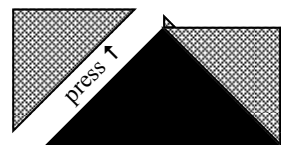


Machine Piece

1. Stitch a C triangle to the right hand side of 4 triangle B's. Align the long edge of the C's with the short edges of the B's. The tips of the C's extend above the B's. Press toward the C's.

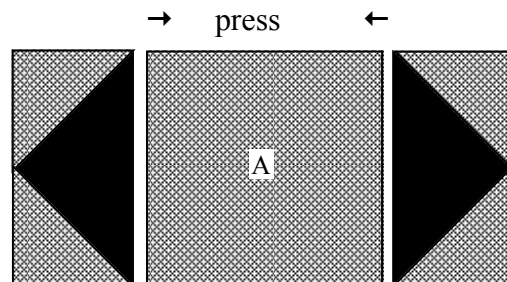


2. Repeat step 1, but this time attach the C triangles to the left hand side of the B triangles. Press toward the C's to make 4 four rectangles that measure 2" x 3 1/2". Trim any tips that extend beyond the unit.

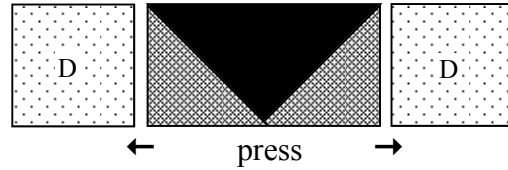

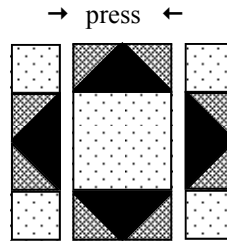
3. Sew 2 of the just finished rectangles to opposite sides of 1 square A. Press toward A.



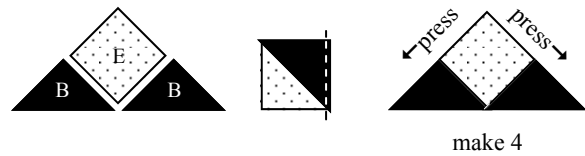
4. Sew 1 square D to each side of the 2 remaining rectangles. Press toward the D's.



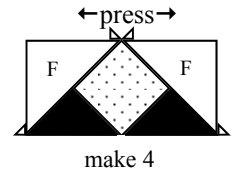
5. Match up edges and seams and sew the just finished strips to the remaining sides of the center A square. Press toward A.



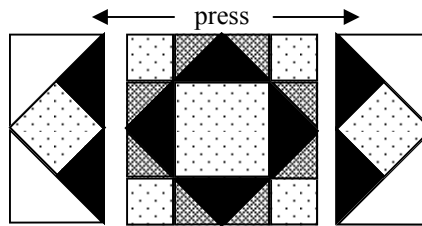
6. Stitch a triangle B to adjacent sides of each square E to make 4 triangles. (Hint: Match the corners of the triangles with the corners of the squares. The tips of the triangles extend beyond the edges of the squares.) Press toward the B's and trim any tips that extend beyond the edges of the triangles.



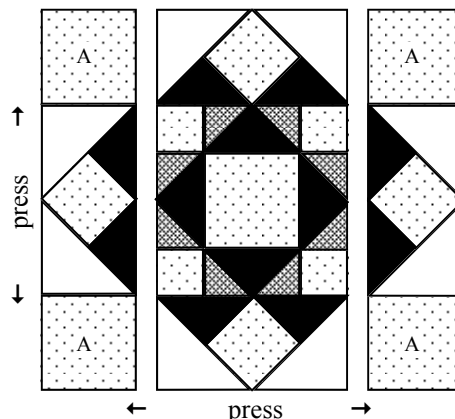
7. Stitch a triangle F to adjacent sides of the just finished triangles and make 4 rectangles that measure 3 1/2" x 6 1/2". Press toward the F triangles. (Refer to steps 1 & 2 if you need extra help.) Trim any tips that extend beyond the rectangles.



8. Match up edges and seams and sew a just finished rectangle to opposite sides of the center square. Press toward the center.



9. Sew an A square to each side of the 2 remaining rectangles. Press toward the A's. (Refer to step 4 if you need extra help.)



10. Match up edges and seams and sew the just finished strips to the remaining sides of the center square. Press toward the strips. Congratulations, your block is now finished and should measure 12 1/2" x 12 1/2" square.

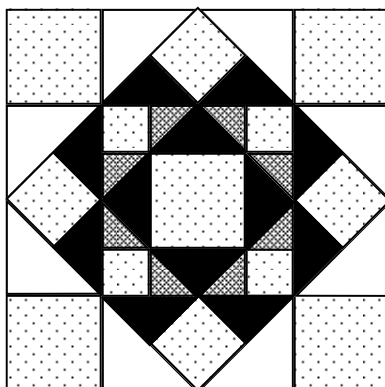

Hull's Victory was a famous naval battle during the war of 1812. Isaac Hull was the captain of "Old Ironsides" and part of the story refers to his pants splitting on deck and the wager of a hat.

Hull's Victory was published as a quilt pattern by Clara Stone. Clara published patterns in *Hearth and Home* magazine and the *Practical Needlework: Quilt Patterns*, booklet of 1906.

Hull's Victory also inspired a contra dance.
